Capacity Building Workshop

In the first week of Term 3 Holiday, we held a Capacity Building Workshop called "Working alongside Refugees and Their Families". It was organised at Hagley College. It is an annual training offered by Hagley College to individuals and organizations providing resettlement services to refugee people. Through the project, Hagley has been able to raise awareness of the needs of refugee communities and build the capacity amongst government and local community agencies through the workshop. Since September 2008, there have been twenty-three Capacity Building Workshops developed, funded and delivered.

This year, a total of 67 attended the workshop and came from 43 organizations. They had access to a variety of materials and resource guide books and listened to ten key speakers coming from refugee communities and supporting agencies.

Capacity Building workshop received positive feedback from the participants and they would like more training in the area. They found the programme valuable to their work.

Below is some feedback from the students participating in the NCEA Holiday programme:


"The teachers help me doing my work and help me answer the questions that I can't answer"

Abdul Rahman Ikhtiari Award is created to honour the memory of Abdul Rahman Ikhtiari who was a teacher in Afghanistan and worked as a volunteer here at Hagley for four years. He was sadly murdered in Christchurch in 2008. He was very much respected and known for his selflessness and generosity of spirit and it is in the spirit of this community-oriented man that Hagley awards this scholarship specifically to students from refugee background who have excelled to support them with future studies.



NCEA Night at Hagley College

On Tuesday evening 4 July 2017 Hagley College had another NCEA/Careers and Pathways night in conjunction with Scholarship Night at the Multi-Ethnic Homework Centre.

Teachers presented information on NCEA and how to achieve at each level (credits, achieved, merit and excellence). There was a group of high school students from schools around Christchurch, including Avonside Girls, Boys High, Hagley College, Burnside High School, Papanui High School and more.

The presentation also included the differences between Certificate, Diploma, and Degree courses and the different entry requirements. The group examined several pathways and what was needed to enter the programmes. Areas explored included nursing, IT, plumbing, law and culinary.

The group found the entry requirements for each pathway, and looked at NCEA levels, literacy, maths, IELTS and important subjects for each area of study. This gave students a sampling of different pathways and a better understanding of what tertiary institutions are asking for from prospective students and of what scholarships are available to finance their tertiary education.

While the careers and pathways sessions were happening, other education activities were taking place in the classrooms next door for primary and intermediate aged students.

In other classrooms, primary and intermediate students from all over Christchurch were working on their literacy, maths and computing skills. These kind of events happen every Tuesday and Wednesday evening at Hagley College.

The multi-ethnic Homework Centre is about much more than homework.
