After 3 gives adult and senior students the opportunity to study a wide range of courses away from their daytime commitments. Most courses run from early evening during the week and, in some cases, in the weekend. We offer over 50 courses in the faculties of Art and Media, Business & Community Studies, English, English Language Learning, Food and Hospitality, Languages, Mathematics, Performing Arts, Practical Design (Textiles and Technology courses), Science Health Studies and Tertiary Pathways.



My Story



HAGLEY WRITERS' INSTITUTE

Do you want to take your writing seriously and be guided and extended?

Since 2007, the Hagley Writers' Institute has offered a challenging and stimulating programme for adult writers in Ōtautahi

Course Components

Course Structure

Groups of up to 12 students work with a teacher to write in a range of forms. Tutors introduce students to a wide range of quality writing, and encourage them to explore different forms. Students are supported to pursue their own interests, from poetry, long and short-form fiction and creative non-fiction, to memoir, theatre script, screenplay, and hybrid forms. Students become expert readers, learn to give and receive critique, and establish their own writing practice. They also hear from guest speakers and participate in workshops by established local and visiting writers. The course is a valuable way to connect with other writers and find opportunities to participate in the local writing community. Each student is also assigned a mentor to provide expert feedback on a small portion of their work.

Outcomes

Students prepare a portfolio of their best work as a requirement of graduation. There is also a half-folio option. At the end of the year, the portfolios are assessed internally for the Hagley Writers' Institute Certificate and endorsed at either 'attainment' or 'cum laude' (distinction) level. Students receive written feedback on their work. A shortlist of the full portfolios are externally assessed and the Margaret Mahy Award is given to one portfolio to acknowledge writing excellence.

Programme

Classes are designed to fit in with writers' busy schedules and are held on Saturday mornings from 9.30am-12.30pm for 20 weeks spread throughout the first three terms – 7 weeks in Terms 1 and 2, and 6 weeks in Term 3. Students accepted into the Institute are expected to make a serious commitment to their writing practice in addition to the Saturday morning classes.

Second-year writers' class: In 2024, we are offering an advanced, second-year class on Saturday afternoons (1:30-4:30pm) for students who have already completed at least one year at Hagley Writers' Institute to further extend their writing skills.

Online option: For students living outside of Canterbury we will be offering an online Tuesday evening class (6:30-9:30pm) via Zoom in 2024, following the same format as the Saturday morning option.

Classes need a minimum number of students to run.

This programme is part of a collaboration with the University of Canterbury to offer a pathway to Engineering or Product Design.

In Term 3 & 4 of 2024 you complete a Level 2 NCEA Physics and Maths integrated course in our After 3 programme. Upon successful completion, this will lead you to the next stage, a Certificate of University Preparation (CUP) at UC. Successful completion of the CUP course in the relevant subjects (Maths, Physics and /or Chemistry) would then mean you could enrol in a first year Engineering course or Product Design course.

Numeracy for Uni

Numeracy for Engineering and Physical Sciences (13EPS) 2 Semesters

The aim of the course is to prepare students with numeracy, algebra, basic trigonometry and graphing skills. This course runs twice a year with the option to start in February or June, leading into the July or November CUP programmes.

No NCEA credits for this course.

13EPS leads into the University CUP course TRNS007 Prepatory Mathematics

TUE 6-9PM

Numeracy for Other Degrees (11MATN)

Students wanting to meet basic numeracy requirements for university entry (e.g. for Social Work or Education) or for entry into CUP can enrol in 11MAT on Tuesday evenings. 11MAT is a full year course.

The 11MAT course leads into the university CUP course *TRNS009 An Introduction to Statistics and Probability,* which prepares students for Commerce and other degrees.

Catch-Up College

Hagley's Catch-Up College enables students to get the credits they need to enter tertiary study.

We offer a wide range of subjects in our January Intensive, as well as individualised Catch-Up enrolments into our Senior College through the year. Talk to us if you need credits in English, Maths or another subject at any level for particular course entry requirements.

Combining After 3 courses with day programmes

If you are also studying during the day at Te Puna Wai o Waipapa - Hagley College, the fee is based on the total number of classes being studied.

Free Enrolment

Enrol for free if you are the caregiver/parent of an adolescent studying at Te Puna Wai o Waipapa - Hagley College.

This also includes Hagley Preschool, course costs extra.

Material Fees

Material fees are applicable in some After 3 courses, in addition to the enrolment fee. Please see individual courses for details.

All material fees are an annual fee and must be paid at the time of enrolment. If you are unable to make payment in full, please see us to arrange a payment plan at the time of enrolment in order to confirm your place in the course.

Refund Policy:

(Refunds will be paid into the bank account of the person or agency responsible for the payment.)

Enrolment Fee

If a class is cancelled by the College or you withdraw before the February start date you will receive a full refund.

If you withdraw from classes within two weeks from the start of the course you will be refunded minus a \$50 administration fee. There will be no refund if you withdraw from classes more than two weeks after the course start date.

Materials Costs

Subject cost will be refunded at the discretion of the Tutor and will be based on costs already incurred.

YOU CAN PAY BY:

Cash, Eftpos, Visa/Mastercard or via internet banking. This can be done at the Enrolment Centre.



Eligibility

You are eligible to enrol in After 3 courses if:

- · You are a NZ citizen or permanent resident or
- · You are an Australian citizen
- · You are aged 16 or over
- You are not currently enrolled in a secondary/correspondence school

As required by the Ministry of Education all students must provide proof of identity.

This can be either a:

- NZ birth certificate or passport
- Australian passport
- NZ Citizenship Certificate
- Passport with proof of residency
- Current student visa

Visitor visas or work permits are not eligible for enrolment.

Because After 3 programmes are designed to move students on a pathway to further learning, you can only be enrolled for a maximum of two years in a course (exception is a language course).



Keep Us Updated

Let us know if you will be away from class

You must let us know in person or through email if you are going to be away during the year **for more than three** classes.

This should be completed as soon as possible, at least two weeks prior to the leave dates. A leave application form can be picked up from the Enrolment Centre or we can email one to you.

If we have not heard from you and you are absent for more than three classes, we will remove you from the roll and your place may be taken by a waitlisted student.

We will attempt to contact you at the phone numbers and email addresses you give us. **Please keep us updated if your contact details change.**

We will text you if a class is cancelled so please include your mobile number when enrolling.



Course Info

- After 3 courses run for a full school year during school term times.
- Most courses run once a week from Monday to Thursday.
- Most courses start at 6.00pm. Where courses are delivered at different times, this will be detailed in the course information we give you.
- Depending on the course, field trips or additional workshops may be scheduled throughout the year. Your teacher will provide details at the start of your course.
- If places become available, new enrolments may be accepted during Term 1 and 2.
- Students must attend all classes between February and March 2024 for funding reasons.
